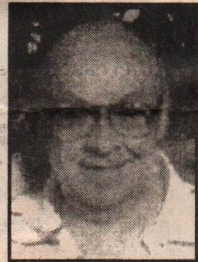
Darwin Davis, 76, Des Moines, was born in Quincy. He died of cancer Feb. 22, 2001, at his home.
